## House Votes to Prohibit Satellite Exports to China

Furor Brings Overwhelming Support for Move

WASHINGTON, May 20 — In a bipartisan show of support, the House today voted to prohibit the export of American-made satellite technology to China. The measure, which passed 387-17, is a significant step in the effort to restrict the flow of sensitive technology to the Chinese government, which is accused of using such technology for military and intelligence purposes. The House vote comes in the wake of a similar move by the Senate last week. The measure is part of a broader effort to limit the export of dual-use technologies to China, which is seen as a major competitor of the United States in the high-tech industry. The House vote is expected to be signed into law by President Clinton.

## SUHARTO, BESIEGED, STEPS DOWN AFTER 32-YEAR RULE IN INDONESIA

ISSUES AN APOLOGY

Vice President Quickly Sworn In — Military Promises Backing

JAKARTA, Indonesia, Thursday, May 21 — President Suharto today announced his resignation and stepped down after 32 years in power, handing the reins of power to his vice president, B.J. Habibie. Mr. Suharto's resignation was announced in a televised address to the nation. He apologized for his 32-year rule and promised to support the new president. The military has promised to support the new president and to remain neutral in the political process. The resignation comes in the wake of a series of protests and a military-led coup attempt. The new president, B.J. Habibie, was sworn in today. He is expected to take office on May 23.
